1) District Grants for International Projects

“**District Grants** are [funded by] block grants to the District that allow clubs and districts to address immediate needs in their own communities **and in other countries.**”

- For Global Grants, the minimum budget is \$30,000
- District Grants can be used for smaller international projects.
- With Global Grants, it is necessary to partner with a Rotary Club in the “host” country
- With District Grants for international projects, this is not strictly necessary, but it’s wise.

The Kenya Project for Girls is an example:

- Davis Sunrise contribution \$ 3,400
- District 5160 DDF \$ 6,800
- Total budget (approx.) \$10,200

2) The Kenya Project for Girls

The need: Many girls in Kenya (and many other countries) miss school while menstruating because they can’t afford commercial feminine hygiene products. They “make do.”

The Results:

- Embarrassment and humiliation
- Many girls miss up to a week of school each month
- Some consequences are more serious (Recently in Kenya, a school girl took her own life following an embarrassing moment.)

The goals: in partnership with Nakuru Rotary Club

- Design a reusable sanitary pad that can be made easily from materials locally available in Kenya and that is comfortable and effective to use.
- Train local women in making the pads.
- Make 8,000 pads for 1,000 girls and distribute them to needy girls in village schools.
- Kick-start a cooperative that will make and sell pads locally.
- Empower the women in the coop and provide them a livelihood.

A pilot project. We hope to learn how to replicate this project effectively in other areas.

Progress Report

- Three women’s groups in Nakuru and nearby villages are now producing reusable sanitary towels.
- We are developing a business model for a cooperative.
- So far the project has distributed over 2,000 pads to needy girls in 10 schools in the Nakuru area. We are following-up to learn the results.
- The response by some of the students has been overwhelmingly positive.
- Women in the sewing groups have found a new sense of purpose and community.
